





## **Urban dwellers: Shift from "community attraction" to suburbia**






## Shift to a voluntary, self-selection migration



Push-Pull Factors: Before and After 2000, %











# A growing trend of disengagement and seperatism

1. Related but separate diasporas (integration impossible):
